Nominating Committee Report

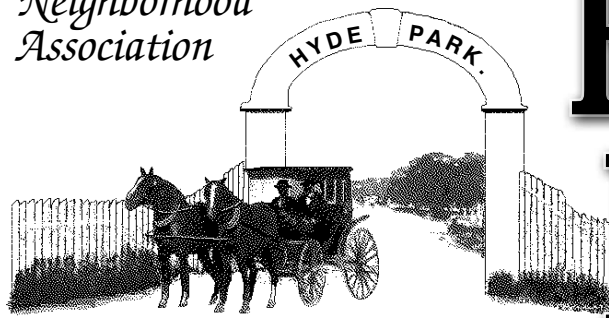

Resolutions for Vote at the October Meeting

Editor's Note: At the October meeting, the membership will discuss the following resolutions, consider amendments to them, and vote on presenting them to Austin City Council.

Resolution Concerning the Designation of Guadalupe from 29th Street to 51st Street as an Activity Corridor

Whereas, the Planning Commission has forwarded to City Council a proposal that Guadalupe Street between 29th Street and 51st Street be designated as an Activity Corridor; and

Whereas, the term "Activity Corridor," since it was first introduced in the ImagineAustin plan, has changed in its significance from being a descriptive term to being a prescriptive term; and

Whereas, the prescribed zoning now attributed to Activity Corridors differentially impacts neighborhoods based on neighborhood characteristics such as size, density, and historic zoning; and

Whereas, CodeNEXT has not yet specified the neighborhood implications of the term "Activity Corridor;" and

Whereas, the prescriptive use of the term "Activity Corridor" overrides the neighborhood plans of neighborhoods adjacent to Activity Corridors; and

Whereas the City of Austin and numerous individual neighborhoods have devoted significant time, energy, and financial resources to the creation and adoption of neighborhood plans; and

Whereas the Hyde Park neighborhood was not provided with sufficient opportunity for public input and discussion of this designation,

Therefore, be it resolved that the Hyde Park Neighborhood Association opposes the designation of Guadalupe Street between 29th Street and 51st Street as an Activity Corridor if that designation will in any way serve as a tool for blanket zoning changes that override adopted neighborhood plans and NCCDs that were created through a full public process.

Resolution Concerning the Transportation Bond Proposal

Whereas, on August 18, 2016, the Austin City Council voted 7-1-3 to place the \$720 million transportation bond proposal on the November 8, 2016, ballot; and

Whereas, residents of the Hyde Park neighborhood have expressed the following important concerns about the transportation bond proposal:

1. The potential impact of the individual features of the bond proposal on neighborhood plans has not been considered. After decades of time, energy, and financial resources devoted by individual neighborhoods and the City of Austin to the development of neighborhood plans, the HPNA urges City Council to respect and support those plans.

2. The size of this bond proposal negatively impacts the likelihood of bond proposals in the immediate future that address alternative transportation options that concentrate more on moving people than moving automobiles, specifically, a proposal for a light rail system.

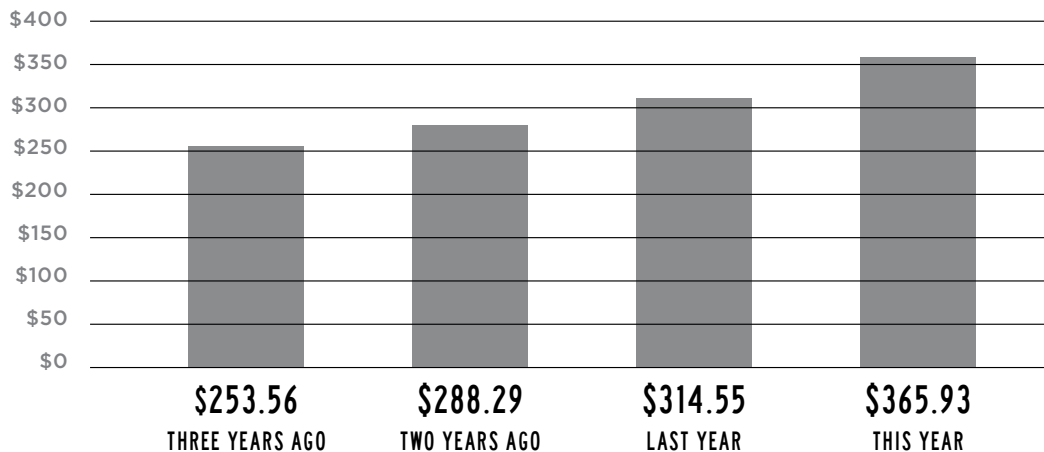

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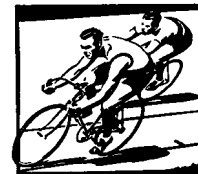

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HPNA General Meeting Minutes: September 12, 2016

Reid Long called the meeting to order at 7:10 pm. There was ice cream and sorbet available, in honor of this year's weather-postponed-then-canceled Ice Cream Social That Never Was.

John Williams of the Nominating Committee announced this year's slate of officers, to be voted on at the October meeting (end of term noted in parentheses):

- Co-Presidents: Reid Long (2017), Kevin Heyburn (2017)
- Co-Vice Presidents: Betsy Clubine (2018), Kathy Lawrence (2017)
- Co-Secretaries: Artie Gold (2017), Susan Marshall (2018)
- Treasurer: Suzanne Walker (2018)
- Steering Committee Members: Joan Burnham (2017), Mark Fishman (2017), Paula Rhodes (2018), Karin Wilkins (2017), Sarah Cook (2018), Lorre Weidlich (2017 - Immediate Past President), Dorothy Richter (Life-long Term)

Co-President Kevin Heyburn then presented a proposed change to the DRC. The proposal, as passed by the Steering Committee, would have had the DRC provide a default answer of "Do not support" for any covered requests (mostly demolitions or variances) by applicants who have not appeared before the DRC. [The proposal itself can be found in the September *Pecan Press*.]

It was suggested that we attempt to do more outreach to the community, lest applicants not know about the DRC process. Hyde Park is the most protected neighborhood in Austin, with various zoning overlays: there is a Local Historic District as well as the Hyde Park and North Hyde Park NCCDs.

Adam Wilson proposed an amendment that, instead of taking a "Do not support" position on issues not taken to DRC, the DRC make no comment. This amendment passed 19 in favor, 3 against, with 2 abstentions. After the amendment and some discussion, Kevin Heyburn made a motion to table the issue and push consideration to the October meeting. This motion passed 24 in favor, 1 against, with 1 abstention.

Adam Wilson and Mark Fishman then reported on the status of the renovation plans for Shipe Pool. In general, there are no changes since the last report. The City is still working on obtaining waivers from the Health Department to limit the number of fixtures required (which is determined by the total surface area of the pools). In the future, a resolution might be requested from HPNA in support of any such variances. One idea put forward was to satisfy the requirement by renovating the existing bathrooms, and, at the same time, the historic log cabin.

Next Reid Long led a discussion of the issues regarding 45th Street. The following issues were raised:

- Visibility is bad at intersections.
- Turning from or to 45th Street is hazardous; vegetation and the angle of the street itself make it difficult.
- The curve at 45th near Duval makes the intersection hazardous, particularly for bicycles.
- Speedway is narrow north of 45th Street, particularly near the corner.

- Speed is a concern; though the speed limit is 30 MPH, that limit is more often exceeded than observed.

Proposals for mitigation included the following:

- Make 45th Street one lane each direction with a turn lane.
- Use rumble strips or speed bumps.
- Do not allow parking near the intersection of 45th and Speedway.
- Reroute 45th near Duval.
- Specifically contact Austin 311 about vegetation by the right of way, particularly near corners.

The last item on the agenda, also presented by Reid Long, concerned the flooding issues in Hyde Park over recent years.

The general consensus is that it's only going to get worse. It might be time for residents in the community to invest in remediation measures such as French drains, drywells, retaining walls, pumps, and so forth. Both specific development such as the Winters Building and the renovation of the UT Intramural fields as well as the general growth of impervious cover upstream from the neighborhood have been cited as exacerbating recent problems.

Other proposals included the following:

- Reaching out to the City on the status of drainage improvements that have been on the agenda.
- Forming a Flood and Drainage Committee to keep an eye on these matters. Several volunteers signed up.
- Getting a neighborhood representative on the City's Flood Mitigation Task Force.

After announcements, the meeting was brought to a close at 8:20 pm.

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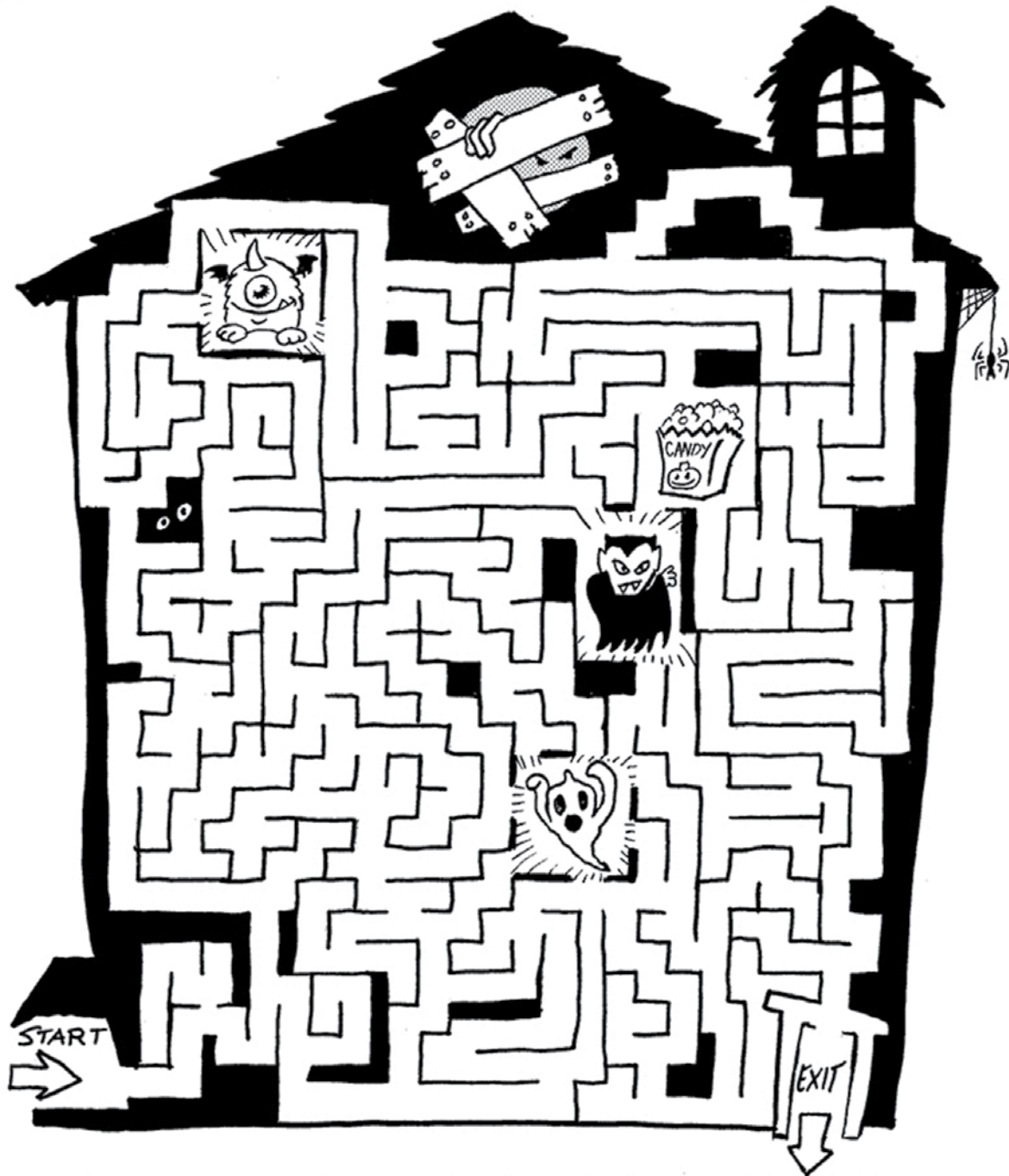

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News from the Ney

Fall is upon us, and the Elisabet Ney Museum kicks into the season with some wonderful and exciting opportunities for everyone.

First things first. The Museum is happy to be working with the City of Austin Cultural Arts Division's TEMPO program by presenting two new temporary outdoor sculptures on our site. These juried pieces were proposed months ago and finally will be installed in October. On October 1, the Museum will install Austin artist Yuliya Lanina's *Ms. Humpty Dumpty*, a whimsical and ladylike egg figure with motion and sound, which harkens back to the fairy tales and myths that Elisabet herself worked into much of her art but then questions the nature of our cultural memories of these tales. For instance, what if Humpty Dumpty was a woman? The piece will be installed in the museum's West Trail and will remain on site through December.

Another TEMPO project that will be coming to the Museum is *Ney Remixed*, a unique tech-based project by Lisa Woods and Rolfo Magnus. This is a digitally hacked and laser-cut replica of a bust made by Elisabet, which will feature multiple materials and special lighting. It explores the notion of hacking as art and the results of that exploration. A "Hackathon" event, focused on the Ney Museum, will take place in early 2017 as a part of the installation of this piece, which will leave the site in February 2017.

On Saturday, October 22, the Museum will be hosting another terrific nature walk through the native landscape. Not only are there an unusual number of fall wildflowers, there's still more to meet the eye that isn't quite as obvious. Native landscapes perform very important tasks year 'round. Find out more about the landscape itself and the many species within it at this very informative 45-minute walk, starting at 1:00 pm.

The Museum's favorite nod to October traditions continues this year with the Third First Annual POLKAPOCALYPSE! You're not going to find an event like this anywhere, period! Starting at noon on Sunday, October 30, the event features bands including Austin's Fabulous Polkasonic, Houston's Polish Pete and the Polka I Hardly Even Knew Her Band, and San Antonio's Grammy Award-winning Los Texmaniacs! The final act, as usual, will be Brave Combo! And it's all free! There will also be booths, food trucks, a dance floor, and more. So stuff your lederhosen into your boots and kick up your heels at POLKAPOCALYPSE!

Until it is...


The wait for a light to change at an intersection



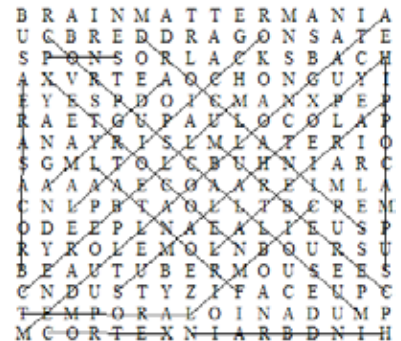
