

# HPNA December Meeting Minutes:

On December 4, 2006 at 7: 00 p.m., Elaine Meenahan, President of the Hyde Park Neighborhood Association, called the monthly general meeting to order.

Bruce Thompson, executive director of **Helping Hand Home for** Children, gave a heartwarming presentation explaining the mission, history and needs of the neighborhood residential childcare agency. The home is a neighborhood treasure and has been located at 3804 Avenue B since the Rotary Club donated the facility in 1925. The presentation began with a short but informative video outlining the organization's history and growth. Helping Hand was formed in 1893 when a baby girl was discovered in a shoe box at Austin's railway station. Word quickly spread about the baby and a group of Austin women came together to

ecology of the community of Hyde Park through various HPNA general and committee meetings. This is accomplished by combining the efforts of residents in effecting improvement, restoration and preservation of our community. Some of the goals of the HPNA are to encourage people to live here; to educate residents on options regarding home ownership, zoning, etc.; to promote preservation and enhancement of existing building stock; and to nurture and preserve our natural green spaces.

The Association is made up of residents of Hyde Park. Unlike a homeowner association, people do not have to own property to be a member. They simply have to be at least 18 years old and live here. However, to be a voting member of the HPNA, they have to join the organization and pay annual dues (currently \$1 per person per year). The HPNA typically meets on the first Monday of the month (unless that is a holiday). The agenda for this meeting is posted in the Pecan Press, the bulletin board at Fresh Plus, and our neighborhood listservs.

In October of each year, the general membership votes on its officers (President, Vice President, Treasur-

er and Secretary). It also votes on six additional members to be Steering Committee members. This Steering Committee (SC) consists of all of the elected officers and Steering Committee members as well as the immediate past year's HPNA President. The SC meets on the Monday following the general meeting – typically the second Monday of the month. These meetings are open to the public.

In order to vote at a meeting, one must have been a paid member for at least 30 days. The 30 day period is determined from the date payment is received or the post mark date if it is mailed. Proxy or absentee voting is not allowed.

The HPNA consists solely of volunteers. In addition to the officers and other SC members, numerous good citizens step forward to head standing and ad hoc committees or act as representatives for the neigh-

borhood in various other roles. From the Homes Tour Chair to the Pecan Press editor to the Social Chair, all of these individuals perform necessary and important functions in the neighborhood. These individuals are required to periodically meet with the SC to give updates on issues concerning their committees

As part of the changing times, the internet has become an important tool for neighbors to learn what is happening in their community.

We have a website <www.hydeparkaustin.org> that provides a short history of our neighborhood, lists contact information for all committees and gives details on relevant issues in the neighborhood. We also have a listserv <a href="http://groups.yahoo.com/group/hydeparkaustin">http://groups.yahoo.com/group/hydeparkaustin</a> that currently boasts 473 members. This tool allows neighbors to communicate in real time on a variety of topics such as crime, lost animals and meetings. HPNA members can also join a member only list <a href="http://groups.google.com/group/HPNA-Notice">http://groups.google.com/group/HPNA-Notice</a>. This list can only be posted by a few officers of the Association. It is used only to post notices of meetings and agendas.

The HPNA raises money from basically two endeavors – advertising from the *Pecan Press*, and the annual Homes Tour (ticket sales, ad sales, and corporate underwriting). All financial matters including the budget operate on a calendar year. The Finance Committee presents a budget in November of each year to the Steering Committee. In December, the general membership votes

on the adoption of that budget for the next calendar year.

A conflict of interest provision was included in the latest version of the bylaws. It prevents any HPNA officer, representative or committee member from voting on any issue on which he/she may realize any direct or material benefit. The conflict of interest may be disclosed by the individual or any other person aware of a situation.

Not every nuance of the bylaws has been covered here, but I hope this column does explain generally how and why the Association functions. The key to it all is our residents. It takes various levels of time, commitment and expertise to make it work. Unlike a homeowner association that is formed by a developer of a subdivision and is mandatory to join if purchasing a property in that subdivision, a neighborhood association not only operates but thrives on volunteer community involvement to improve and enhance its community. Whether we just moved here or have lived here most or all of our lives, we all play a role in shaping the neighborhood in which we live. I encourage every resident to get involved in whatever capacity he/she feels passionate about. One person can and does make a huge difference to our community.

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
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### Around & About the Avenues

### Happy New Year, Neighbors!

Tow that you have exchanged gifts and, hopefully, have learned how to use your new electronic equipment, it's time to think about protecting your home from burglary. Officer Vargas reports that residential burglaries continue to be the biggest challenge in our neighborhood. I have read neighbors' emails regarding items being stolen from front porches and yards. Several of you had strollers taken and, after reporting it to the police, later found out that they had been resold at a children's store. Officer Vargas told me that it appears to be juveniles who are committing these crimes. While there have been several arrests, some criminals remain on the loose. So, please take extra precaution, to guard against the temptation, by bringing your belongings into the house or garage.


Officer Vargas also reports that Bobby Joe Kelly, the transient known for tire slashing, has been arrested for burglary of a business. It's good news for the neighborhood that he will be locked away for years.

Now that APD has a full time Graffiti Detective who is making cases, graffiti appears to be down.

One neighbor reported that, while outside, she noticed a guy riding his bike and acting suspiciously by doing circles while looking into her garage. When he noticed her looking at him, he left only to come back a few hours later. This is an example of what should be reported to the police. Get a good description and call 311.

Safety Tips: As you are disposing of boxes, turn the labels inside as you fold them up for recycling, so that criminals cannot see what you have in your home. Remember that the best way to protect your home from crime is to stay vigilant, watch out for each other and keep your doors and windows locked. Remove valuable items from your cars and lock the doors. Report suspicious behavior by calling 311 and 911, if a crime is in progress.




Standing Room Only on Woodburn House Porch at HPNA Holiday Party


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### In Memoriam: Alton W. Weiss

The *Pecan Press* extends deepest sympathy to the family of Alton Weiss, who lived for many, many years at 4004 Ave. H. Mr. Weiss died recently at the age of 93.

In his lifetime, Mr. Weiss held many career positions. He was a former cotton gin owner, a part-time rancher and a teacher. He proudly served as a State Trooper and a deputy sheriff. He also served as the Sergeant at Arms with Texas House of Representatives, State Purchaser with the Texas State Board of Control, and Industrial Sales Coordinator with the Department of Corrections.


Closer to home, many of us in Hyde Park knew Mr. Weiss as a friend and an active member of HPNA. He was always there when there was work to be done. He stayed calm when tempers flared, and often had a solution to whatever the problem might be. For example, Mr. Weiss was the very heart and soul of the first generation of the Hyde Park Alley Cats. When it was time for the Alley Cats to prowl and prune and clean the Hyde Park alleys, Mr. Weiss drove his truck, shared in the work, kept an eye on the volunteers, and never stopped smiling and encouraging everyone. He also spearheaded Hyde Park's first-ever Neighborhood Watch program, which had a major and lasting impact on crime prevention efforts in the neighborhood. Indeed, the HPNA meeting devoted to launching that effort drew what many considered to be the highest turnout in the history of Association meetings.

In addition to Florine, his wife of 69 years, Mr. Weiss is survived by a large and loving family including five children, seven siblings, six grandchildren, four great-grandchildren, and numerous other loved ones and friends.

Hyde Park will miss Mr. Weiss, but our neighborhood is better and stronger because he was our friend and our neighbor.


raise her and formed what was to become the longest continuously operating residential childcare agency in Travis County, a priceless resource kept strong and viable through community support.

Helping Hand Home is currently home to 41 boys and girls and works hard to attain its mission to maintain a therapeutic home for children and to restore each child to a healthy family setting. The children in the home, ranging in age from 5 to 12, have been the victims of severe physical, sexual and emotional trauma. It is the home's goal for the children to take responsibility for their own actions, leave with a sense of worth, improve their academic skills and gain an increased sense of trust. The home is working to maintain this goal with the support of volunteers who help through giving everything from financial help to working directly with the children as tutors or friends. The home is always in need of volunteers — to learn more feel free to stop by the home or just go to the website at <www.helpinghandhome.org>.

Next on the agenda was a presentation by Matt Whelan, Senior Vice President of Catellus Development Corporation, the master developer of the **Mueller Redevelopment**, the nearly 600-acre site located at 51st Street and Airport Blvd. Catellus is working to create what they hope will be a synergistic and unique self-sustaining mixed use development in the heart of the city. The redevelopment had a unique start in that the community was afforded the opportunity to set out their vision for the old

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
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

airport's redevelopment and solicited firms to carry it out — the opposite of many typical development plans.

Catellus has articulated these central guidelines for integration in the development: fiscal, economic, compatibility, diversity and sustainability. The neighborhood, which is set to break ground in the summer of '07, will be a diverse community consisting of 577 row homes/shop homes, 1,160 apartments and condos, 1,525 yard homes, 264 "Mueller Homes" (homes designed to look like mansions but are actually 4 to 6 individual family units), along with a number of mixed use apartment units.

The development will also include the 14-acre Dell Children's Medical Center of Central Texas, set to open the summer of 2007. Another integral element of the community will be the Rathgeber Village for community nonprofits - including the Austin Children's Shelter, Family Eldercare, and many other service agencies – which are building new facilities on an adjacent tract of land donated by developer/philanthropist Dick Rathgeber. The Austin Film Studios (located on 51st Street) are within the Mueller site that will become mixed-use commercial, although the specific development plans are still pending.


In an effort to further enhance and beautify the community, Catellus has set aside 140 acres, nearly 20% of the site's total acreage, as green space — including an ornamental entry to the Mueller neighborhood (on Aldrich Street off Airport Boulevard) which has been planted with crepe myrtles and two massive twin oaks, moved from elsewhere on the property. Just south will be the Welcome Center and Lake Park (under construction). The greenway running from the fire station on Airport Boulevard westward in an arc to the interstate will provide the first open/recreation area for the site; several others are planned throughout the neighborhood.

Mueller hopes to maximize utilization of two of today's most important trends in development — New Urbanism and Green Building. The compact, walkable mixed-use urban village means Mueller neighbors will have choices that don't necessarily involve getting in the car and polluting the air. And it means thousands of people can live in high-quality, reasonably priced neighborhoods without moving out to the edge of town and adding to suburban sprawl.

The community also combines Austin's homegrown Green Building Program — one of the best in the nation — with national LEED standards. Mueller's designs are resource-efficient, use non-toxic and recyclable regional materials, and help maintain and improve air and water quality. And the extensive greenspace system, along with Mueller's innovative utility systems, also will help keep Mueller clean, green, and sustainable. Next, **HPNA Finance Committee** Chair Nick Van Bavel gave a presentation outlining the past year's budget. The presentation consisted of a 10 minute slideshow

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

with a detailed outline of the past year's projected vs. actual performance. Most notable was the total annual income, which was projected to be \$40,620 but finalized at \$46,779; the overage can be attributed to the \$7,000 allocated to the sidewalk project that was never used. All other categories were extremely close to projections (any overage in expenses was recaptured through unexpected income). Currently, the Association has \$41,000.00 in liquid funds.

Following the 2006 budget presentation, Nick outlined the proposed budget for 2007. The most notable changes were the projected income, which was increased by \$7,000. This optimism can be attributed to the projected growth in the income produced by the *Pecan Press* due to a 10% increase in advertising costs. The largest change in the budget is the \$5,000 allotted to the Historic Preservation Investigation Committee, as well as the \$5,000 reduction (adjusted from \$7,000 to \$2,000) of funds for the sidewalk committee. Nick made a motion that the Association adopt the proposed budget that was seconded by Wanda Penn and approved unanimously.

The final presentation of the night was made by Wanda Penn concerning the \$100,000 **mitigation fund provided by Austin Energy**. The funds must be initiated by September 2007 or they will be lost. The urgency to use the funds was recently realized due to the fact that we are in the last planting season before the September deadline. After the proposition to use the monies to create a local historic district was denied due to its inapplicability to AE's requirement of community beautification other ideas were considered. The proposals that were deemed successful by Austin Energy were landscaping type projects which will be most easily implemented by committees and individuals.

The final announcement made at the meeting included a request for assistance in researching the neighborhood history for the **Historic Preservation Investigation Committee** by Sharon Majors. If you would like to help you can contact Sharon via email at <sharonmajors@grandecom.net>.

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
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## Neighbors' Vigilance Promotes Compatible (Re-)Development

Why and how did the re-birth of Hyde Park happen? What was for many decades a derelict and crime-ridden neighborhood is now an exemplary historic district, as is documented in Dorothy Richter's oral history published in the November 2006 Pecan Press. The answer?: Dorothy and scores of other dedicated and vigilant residents who care.

The November 27th meeting of the Historic Landmark Commission is a case-in-point. Two items relative to Hyde Park were on the agenda: (1) a demolition permit for the century-old house at 311 West 41st Street; and (2) proposed expansive redevelopment of the property at 4309 1/2 Avenue F. Seven HPNA representatives were in attendance at the meeting in City Council chambers: Catherine and John Moore, Wanda Penn, Lorre Weidlich, Jane Anderson, John LaTouf and Mary Carolyn George. Presentations were made by members of our group about the viability of restoring rather demolishing the historic house.

The house at 311 West 41st Street reappeared on the agenda of the December 18th session of the Historic Landmark Commission. Staff persists in recommending release of the demolition permit. Fortunately, twenty-plus HPNA members made informed and impassioned statements about the importance of the house in the development of Hyde Park < with the moral support of many others present who elected not to speak. Commissioners postponed a decision for 60 days while advocates for restoration work out a plan. Hopefully, more information about the house and its heroic rescue will appear in a subsequent issue of the Pecan Press.

Concerns over the inappropriate re-development of the Avenue F cottage < which had been permit-

ted by city staff — extend far beyond those whose lives will be negatively impacted. Prior to the meeting, architect Karen McGraw, chair of the Hyde Park Planning Team, identified specific problems the permitting office failed to identify. To mention only a few of these, they include questions about provisions for proper parking access, impervious cover and fire code issues. A statement from HPNA President Elaine Meeneham and the Steering Committee was read to the commissioners expressing concerns about shoe-horning an overly large two-story house on a tiny 25-foot lot, created when a larger property was subdivided. Sally Robey, the nearest neighbor on Avenue F, also spent the day with city staffers sharing her research. At 10:30 p.m., when the Commission finally addressed the Avenue F dilemma, Steve Sadowsky announced that the building permit had been put "on hold" and that the property owners were advised to re-design the project in compliance with the various codes and regulations as well as the HPNA design guidelines. At the December 18th meeting of the Historic Landmark Commission under "Review of Permits in National Register Historic District" item D2, it was noted that "applicant has not yet submitted revised plans showing compliance with the Hyde Park NCCD. Postponed to January 22, 2007." It is hoped that, working together, a design that is consistent in scale and quality < consistent with the fabric of the neighborhood — will be the felicitous outcome and that the Hyde Park Neighborhood Development Review Committee as well as the Historic Landmark Commission will be involved in the process.
