
HPNA Meeting Minutes: Monday, June 4, 2007

Crigler, from the Travis Central Appraisal District, spoke about the recent property tax appraisal increases. Mark addressed the increases in land values versus improvement values. He noted that with the 2007 appraisals, Travis CAD reviewed the land values and found that these values as compared to the improvement values needed to be increased. He also noted that there are a number of possible items to take to the appeal of your appraisal: recent settlement statement, appraisal by an independent appraiser, contract for sale or listing agreement, contractor plans, engineer reports regarding the foundation, and photographs of the property - inside and outside. They estimated that Travis CAD will receive approximately 52,000 protests this year. After their prepared presentation, both Mark and Marya answered several questions.

Catherine Moore, speaking for the Development Review Committee, announced that Historic Landmark Commission initiated historic zoning for the property at **511 West 41st Street** and rejected the demolition request. Committee members are working with the owners of the buildings in an effort to develop an appropriate plan for the property.

Sharon Majors provided an update on the **Local Historic District** effort and noted that it's not too late to volunteer to be a Block Captain.

After an informative evening, Elaine adjourned the meeting.

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

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Crime Report

Tf you are a member of the Hyde Park Lonline discussion group, you are already well aware of the recent crime wave in the neighborhood. If you are not a Yahoo member and would like to join, go to http://groups.yahoo.com/group/ HydeParkAustin/> and click the "join this group" button on the right. When you register as a Yahoo member, you can get newsgroup messages in your normal email program. If you don't want to sign up for Yahoo, but would like the messages, send an email to <HydeParkAustinowner@yahoogroups.com> for help. You can also find information on <www.austinhydepark.org>

The recent crimes have included homes being burglarized in the middle of the afternoon by busting in the front door, vehicles being broken into and/or stolen, "suspicious characters" asking for work, bicycles being stolen, a woman attacked on the street by a passing truck and even potted plants being taken from front porches. Through the neighborhood emails, neighbors are being informed of what types of crime are happening, where they take place and descriptions of the criminal. This has been an invaluable resource helping us to become more aware of suspicious behavior on our streets.

With the renewed interest in wanting to stop this criminal activity and an increase in members on the listsery, we feel it is a good time to reactivate the Neighborhood Watch Program. At the July 9th HPNA general meeting, APD will make a presentation on basic elements of the Neighborhood Watch crime prevention effort, and answer questions about what is being done and what we can do to help make our neighborhood a safer place to live. You will have an opportunity, at the meeting, to sign up as a volunteer who is trained to recognize and report suspicious activities. Crime prevention involves all of us looking out for each other. Please plan to attend the meeting to learn how you can help combat crime in Hyde Park.

It has been mentioned that August 7, 2007 is National Night Out and that the Neighborhood Association might want to host an event at Shipe Park. This can be discussed at the HPNA general meeting in July and could be a kick-off for the Neighbor-



hood Watch program. On this night, events promote crime and drug prevention awareness and offer an opportunity for strengthening police and community relationships. Residents are asked to turn on their porch lights, lock their doors and spend the evening outside with neighbors, police officers, EMS and fire fighters.

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


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Update: Proposed Hyde Park Local Historic District

There are many things that make Hyde Park special. One is its historical character. Another is the extraordinary efforts that Hyde Park residents have taken to preserve the character of our neighborhood. The fight to preserve Hyde Park began before I arrived here thirty years ago and has continued to this day.

For as long as I have been here, we have wanted a local historic district to preserve our houses, but Austin did not have this sort of zoning overlay. So, neighbors used the tools that were available -- historic zoning for individual houses, the creation of two national historic districts and the NCCD. Many neighbors practically lived at the city offices in order to protect our neighborhood. In spite of these efforts, too many houses were lost.

Now, Austin finally has a local historic district ordinance. Once again Hyde Park is leading the way in neighborhood preservation. The ordinance requires at least 60% approval in writing from all property owners. This is stricter than in other Texas cities, yet we are determined to achieve this status.

Some wonder why we need a local district when we have a national one, and the short answer is that National Register designation is primarily an honor with no ability to regulate alterations to historic buildings or even to stop their demolition. The Austin Landmark Commission conducts a nonbinding review of such changes within a National Register district, but it can only offer advice to property owners.

Local Historic District status will give us many advantages, including:

- Recognition of Hyde Park as an important part of Austin's history.
- The preservation of the character and diversity of Hyde Park.
- The stabilization of housing values along with the possibility of tax advantages and special remodeling loans.

Some wonder about the disadvantages. Certainly for anyone who wants to tear down a historic house, this will be a disadvantage. Others are concerned that options for remodeling and additions will be limited. I can assure you that the district we are crafting will allow compatible remodeling and additions. The main concern will be with the street view. Interior changes will not be affected. Below is a quote from Terri Myers of Preservation Central, who is our consultant on this project. In response to questions some have had about the district's impact on noncontributing properties, Myers writes:

"Even now, if your property is historic but noncontributing in a National Register District it has to go to the Landmark Commission for review, so it wouldn't be any different in a local district. The main difference is that currently, the Landmark decision is nonbinding. Under a Local District, review of old and new, contributing and noncontributing, would be mandatory and the decision binding. It could be appealed to the Board of Adjustment.





Anything that takes place in a Local District comes up for some type of review. I don't know if some things can be approved administratively or not — possibly. But this won't add an additional step to historic buildings — they always had to go to the Landmark Commission unless the city approved administratively. For nonhistoric properties it might add that extra step. I think Steve Sadowsky, the city's preservation officer, can make administrative decisions about nonhistoric properties and they would not have to go to the full Commission. However, they all have to go to the Preservation Planner regardless of age or status for him to decide whether they need to go to the Landmark Commission or not."


In other words, if you have a noncontributing property, you will not be forced to change it. However, if you need to get a building permit, remodeling and additions would need to be reviewed. Most likely the city and the neighborhood would want the changes to be compatible with the neighborhood. That does not mean that they would want to change a post-1960 house into a faux Victorian or craftsman.


Finally, I do not see this as the kind of historic district that will enforce such strict requirements as color choices. These are common on the East Coast. As wonderful as those Eastern neighborhoods are, I don't think that is appropriate for Central Austin. Some of us chose this neighborhood because we value this diversity and do not want to live in a cookie-cutter area. We will soon be forming a design standards committee. If you have opinions about this issue, then I would encourage you join this committee. This is our neighborhood and this is our opportunity to create the kind of district that we want.

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




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floodlines 2007: until next year...



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Honey Bees

Honey bee colonies can often bee found in wall voids, chimneys or attics. To keep bees from entering a structure, seal all holes found in walls, cracks in window framing, knotholes or cracks between wood and brick junctures. If bees are already within a wall void, DO NOT block their entrance as it could lead them into the home.

When honey bees move into a building, they should be removed as soon as possible. This can be handled by a bee keeper or pest control company. Once bees have been in place over three weeks, they produce honeycomb and honey. If honeycomb is present, the wall should be opened and all comb and honey removed to avoid secondary invaders such as cockroaches, moths or other bees.


There has been much media recently on honey bee colony collapsing disorder (CCD). Many honey bee colony deaths have been reported over the last few years and while it's still unknown what is causing the deaths, it is thought that there are numerous factors contributing to CCD. Initial studies show many disease organisms present, but none are the singular cause of the deaths. 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



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


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Fleas

A proper flea management program has two parts- managing fleas on your pet and managing fleas in your environment. You may want to consult your veterinarian about flea control for your pet; there are numerous products on the market that work well.



If you find fleas in your home and you do not have a pet, inspect the attic and/ or crawl space to see if wildlife has moved into the area bringing fleas with them. Remove wildlife with traps and then treat the area with an insecticide labeled for fleas. You may also want to seal the area so that wildlife cannot move in again.

If you are a new homeowner with no pets and have fleas, it is possible that the previous owners had pets. Fleas can remain dormant for several months, but will become active again when they sense vibrations of new hosts.

When you find fleas on a pet, you most likely will need to treat the pet, inside the home and the yard (depending on where you allow your pet to go). Treatment should be targeted to areas where your pet likes to hang out.

There are many things you can do to help reduce fleas without the use of chemicals. Vacuum regularly, getting under furniture and along baseboards. Make sure to dispose of the vacuum bag in an outdoor garbage can at least once a week so the fleas do not hatch out and reinfest the home. Wash pet bedding in hot water. Bath your pets regularly and use a flea comb to remove fleas. Avoid walking pets in known flea infested areas.
