# The Dumpsters of Hyde Park


**Point One**: The outdoor part of this neighborhood, to most of us, is as much "home" as the four walls of our house.

**Point Two:** The City of Austin, after considerable time and money spent to identify its "priorities," has decreed that having a "healthy, safe city" with "sustainable...public health" is high on the priority list. (Check the City's website.)

**Question:** Why are the streets and sidewalks of this neighborhood blighted with garbage dumpsters containing rotted waste, vermin, and graffiti, practically every few blocks?

This month – July, 2009 – marks the one-year anniversary of the start of our campaign to insist that the City enforce its own code on its own property, and force removal of the private dumpsters throughout Hyde Park that are set on or near the curbs and sidewalks. The City's right-of-way includes the sidewalk, the curb, and the land in between. This is public property. By Code, it is not available for private dumpster use, except under a license agreement with the City. There are 20 illegally-placed dumpsters throughout Hyde Park and another 300-plus citywide. So far as we can determine, no dumpster has ever been licensed, no fees ever col-

## **Hyde Park Homes Tour 2009**

T he 2009 Hyde Park Homes Tour, held Fathers' Day weekend June 20-21, richly demonstrated the distinctive diversity and spirit of the Hyde Park community. We grossed \$18,699, including \$4866 in sponsorships, and expenses will be around \$6000. That leaves us with net proceeds of nearly \$13,000, which will enable us to continue to make improvements to Hyde Park and to further our efforts to become a local historic district. Each home had its own personality and style, mirroring the character of our neighborhood. The music at each venue paired beautifully with its surroundings, due

to Mary LaTouf of Book Austin Music.

The house docents did a great job of informing our guests and securing the featured houses. It turns out our bus conductors were incredibly entertaining, as well as very knowledgeable as to the history of Hyde Park and its former residents.

Our tour booklets were excellent, thanks to the hard work and writing skills of Robin Silberling (also web



lected, no fines ever assessed. (Compare: Philadelphia charges a landowner \$3000 a year to post a dumpster on the right-of-way). Today, after a year of pressuring City officials with our 311 reports, follow-up calls, emails, letters, dumpster photos, joint walks through the neighborhood, and innumerable conversations---including an in-person meeting with the City Manager and Assistant City Manager---our success is nothing to brag about. Voluntarily, only five landowners have moved their dumpsters back onto private property. Another 20, as this goes to press, remain on the right-of-way, some hanging over the curb or blocking the sidewalk. We believe the City itself has created this problem by being unwilling to provide trash service to commercial (mostly apartment) properties. So the commercial property owners hire private haulers, who avail themselves of the convenience of curb-side pick-up, and the City turns a blind eye to the violations. Thus, a drive or a stroll down Speedway is still blighted by dumpsters from 38th to 46th, to say nothing of the view from every porch. Why has the City allowed this blighted health hazard to persist in the neighborhood and refused to protect its own public property? Why has the City not provided responsible trash pick-up to these commercial landowners?

We don't know, but we've heard it all: The problem is "complicated." The alleys are too narrow. There would be too many cans. We need more meetings. Fences might need to be moved. Tree limbs are too low. Enforcement needs to be "compassionate." We have to talk to the private trash haulers. Let's talk to some residents. Alleys surfaces aren't tough enough for big trucks.

Our response to all this has been: We think that no more meetings are needed and that the alleys, the trees, and the fences do not need to be altered. Get a smaller truck. It should not be necessary to reconfigure or destroy a neighborhood in order to collect its garbage. There was trash service, we've been at pains to point out, in Greece and Rome. If they can do it, the City of Austin can figure out how to pick up the trash in a multi-family older neighborhood such as ours. Technology and trucks designed for a mall will not work here. If necessary, make new requirements. But the solution cannot be that the garbage is stored, day after day, in dumpsters that blight where we walk, jog, drive, and gather together.



# The Local Historic District Corner

I'm sad to report that north Hyde Park – the J.J.Hegman subdivision – has lost an important structure in its planned Local Historic District. Despite the support of an overwhelming majority of the neighborhood for historic zoning of the house and their objection to what is planned to replace it, the City Council voted against historic zoning.

This is another example of one of the points I introduced last month: the lack of city support for historic zoning. It also points out a common motivation for local historic districts: the desire to protect a neighborhood against structures that are inappropriate because they are out-of-scale or out-of-character for the rest of the neighborhood. This was the motivation behind the Harthan Street Local Historic District; it has been a major issue for the J.J. Hegman subdivision residents; and it is an ongoing fight for the Caswell Street residents of north Hyde Park.

But this issue is not limited to historic preservationists. Even those who don't care about the demolition of historic structures are likely to care about what gets built in their places. Most of us like variety, but most of us do not appreciate living next door to a structure that looms over our own. Compatibility in structure and massing is part of what makes a neighborhood cohesive; incongruity is visually jarring.

Fortunately, the residents of the J.J. Hegman subdivision plan to continue their efforts to create a local historic district. We need to give them our support.





# Crime Report by Carol Welder

Hi Neighbors! I hope that you are all trying to beat the heat by getting your exercise early in the morning or after the sun goes down. As a reminder, while you're out and about the neighborhood, keep your eyes and ears open for any suspicious activity. It seems as if criminal incidents have slowed down a bit, which I believe is directly related to citizen involvement. Raising the awareness level of the neighborhood has helped the police apprehend criminals who may have gone free before. Keep up the good work.

For your information, due to budget cuts, the district representatives have changed again and the future of DR's is questionable. For now, if you should need assistance, contact Officer Kelly LaHood at <Kelly.lahood@ci.austin.tx.us> or at 974-5833.

The Austin Police Department has launched a Webbased communication tool, the Citizens Alert Network, which lets residents sign up to receive crime alerts through emails and text messages. The alerts will include information about wanted suspects, missing persons, weather emergencies and crime trends. In light of budget constraints, technology is being used to help citizens and businesses stay in touch with the Police Department. In addition to alerts, the system lets residents submit anonymous tips through the Web site or through text messages. The Web site also has a mapping tool to view crimes in an area by type and location. To join the Citizens Alert Network: Go to <www.citizenobserver.com/registration.jsp> and fill out the form, selecting the Austin Police Department as the agency.



# HPNA General Meeting Minutes: June 1, 2009

Randy Jewart opened the meeting with an explanation of the Wheatsville Food Gro-op. The Gro-op is an experiment by Austinians who are dedicated to growing food for themselves through a network of local urban farms and gardens. He encouraged neighbors to go by Wheatsville to see the Gro-op plots there, and to consult <www.wheatsville.coop> for more information on how to participate or donate.

Next, Paul Tomasso from the **Code Enforcement** department of the City of Austin Solid Waste Services division began by announcing new personnel, reorganization and a name change. Willie Rhodes, Director of Solid Waste Services, will become the Director of Code Enforcement and the name of the department will be changed to Code Compliance (Tammie Williamson is the new acting director of Solid Waste Services). Before Paul could start his formal presentation on the varied general responsibilities of Code Enforcement in the City of Austin, neighbors eagerly asked multiple questions about issues that are specific to Hyde Park. These issues are mostly related to development, construction, and permit issues. Repeated questions involved construction that has an approved permit, but the permit requirements aren't followed. He emphasized that if there's an active permit, Code Enforcement is not involved in the inspection. Suspected violations of this nature must be referred to the city department that issued the permit and their inspectors. After fielding a number of questions, he started a filmed presentation that showed various Austin citizens and citizen groups talking about the issues from their neighborhoods and how Code Compliance gets involved. The Code Enforcement Division handles a diverse list of items. The website http://www.ci.austin.tx.us/sws/code.htm has detailed information about this department's responsibilities and how to report suspected code enforcement violations for department review.

Roger Temmes from the Care Communities organization was the final speaker of the evening. He came to educate neighbors about the mission of the Care Communities and encourage Hyde Park to get involved. Their mission is to provide practical and compassionate support through care teams for people with serious illness such as AIDS and terminal cancer. Each of their care teams is a group of four to six volunteers who work together as a team to provide non-medical care to a Care Partner (a person living with a serious illness who has applied and been accepted into the Care Program). Each Team offers customized non-medical assistance such as light housekeeping, shopping, transportation, meal preparation, yard work, emotional support and com-
