Carol and Margaret will chart a path through the confusion. They will clarify issues like the following:


The neighborhood plan - How did it come about? What legal weight does it carry? What is its relationship to the city plan?

November is upon us, and with it, the most important event of the year. No, not the election – the Hyde Park Homes Tour! This year's tour answers the question, What is it like to live in a historic district? Can someone with an artistic, eclectic, or modern bent be comfortable living in Hyde Park?

The 2012 Hyde Park Homes Tour showcases homes that real people reinvented to support and reflect their preferred lifestyles while preserving historic architecture. The reward is multi-faceted: vintage homes, tree-covered yards and streets, and local cafés and businesses. Neighbors benefit from a wide diversity of neighbors who, as real people, become real friends. When paraders arrived at the fire station they were welcomed by the music of Albanie Fellata and her Fellas. When all paraders had arrived I welcomed everyone, let neighbors know about the banner honoring this year's award recipients, the posters that were on display by the membership table and the poster to sign at the table, introduced HPNA's new officers, and handed the microphone to Co-Presidents John Williams and Ashley Schweickart.

John and Ashley introduced John Paul Moore, who, together with Councilmember Laura Morrison, unveiled a plaque honoring Dorothy Richter that has been installed on the wall of Fire Station No. 9. It is on the wall that faces 43rd St. Constable Bruce Elfant had suggested to John Paul Moore and Councilmember Morrison's aide Barbara Rush that we might install such a plaque. 





HPNA General Meeting Minutes: October 1, 2012

The meeting was called to order by President Lisa Harris at 7:07 p.m. Announcements included introductions of individuals running in the November election. Ann Teich is running for AISD Board of Trustees District 3, Mary Ellen Pietruszynski and Gina Hinojosa are both running for the AISD Board of Trustees At Large position, and Bruce Elfant is running for Travis County Tax Assessor.

The first item of business was election of the Hyde Park Neighborhood Association Steering Committee. The Nominations Committee put forward the following slate:

Co-Presidents: John Williams & Ashley Schweickart **Vice President:** Mark Fishman

Co-Secretaries: Claire de Young & Mike Pikulski Co -Treasurers: I Jay Aarons & Lynne Hohlfeld At-Large Steering Committee (full terms): Lorre Weidlich, Eric Stumberg, Kathy Lawrence, & Annette Lucksinger

At-Large Steering Committee (vacant seat): Paul Kamprath

Wanda Penn stated that the bylaws call for proportional turnover of At-Large Steering Committee members, so that 3 of the 6 positions should be filled each year. She asked if we could try to get back to that rotation. Lisa Harris stated that we could elect one of the Committee members slated for a full term for just one year instead. Annette Lucksinger volunteered for a one-year term of service. Given this revision to the slate, the Steering Committee slate was adopted 24–0.

The second item of business was a presentation by Mary Arnett on fighting graffiti. Mary stated that, in her experience, instead of being gang-related, 99% of neighborhood graffiti is simply a nuisance created by taggers who are obsessed with defacing property simply to show off their tags. Ms. Arnett then provided a handout on reporting and removing graffiti. Graffiti is prohibited and punishable under the Texas Penal Code and the City has a Graffiti Abatement Program. Graffiti can be reported simply by dialing 3-1-1. Tips for reporting graffiti are to be very specific and detailed on the location and description of the graffiti and to specify if the tag is on public or private property. Additionally, in order to maintain visibility of graffiti as an ongoing problem, Ms. Arnett encouraged neighbors also to make a police report with APD. Both 3-1-1 and APD will provide case numbers for your report and it typically takes two to three

weeks to have the graffiti removed. Graffiti removal is undertaken by the Austin Youth Development Program, providing disadvantaged young adults with a job training opportunity. If you have a specific graffiti removal issue, call Graffiti Abatement Supervisor Ruben Jose Sandoval at 512-854-4591. To contact the AYD Program, call Julia Narum at 512-854-3749.

Ms. Arnett explaind that neighbors can remove graffiti themselves, utilizing products like Mostenbocker's Graffiti Remover from Lowes. The Graffiti Abatement unit can also provide neighborhoods with supplies, such as neutral paint colors. Just be sure to test out the surface first, to ensure that no damage is caused. Ms. Arnett stated that if neighbors are interested in gathering evidence for APD, be sure to take high resolution pictures of the tag with a date and time stamp. Also, take photos that show the context of the tag, such as a wider view showing the street sign or address where the tag was made.

Finally, Ms. Arnett stated that neighbors can lower the frequency of graffiti in Hyde Park by adopting a zero tolerance policy. She encouraged neighborhood patrols, frequent and fast clean up of new graffiti, and partnering with local businesses to provide clean-up supplies. Neighbors asked the difference between a misdemeanor and a felony and Ms. Arnett stated that it depends on the City's calculation of what it would cost for cleanup and the square footage of the tagged surface. Neighbors agreed that eliminating all of the current graffiti in the neighborhood will make new tags easier to spot and that newer tags are also easier to remove yourself. Lisa Harris also reminded neighbors that the City asks neighbors not to use graffiti removers on reflective surfaces but to leave that to 3-1-1.

The floor was then open for announcements. Mark Fishman stated that the Historic Landmark Commission was holding work sessions to create a standardized historic district sign design for all neighborhoods to use and that he would be attending these sessions to provide input. Lorre Weidlich provided a brief update on the Hyde Park Homes Tour. Lorre stated that the Homes Tour will take place on Sunday, November 11th from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. The theme will be "Reinvested, Rewarding, & Real." There are seven houses on the tour this year, none of which have been on the Homes Tour previously. Lorre stated they are still looking for more volunteers, particularly Docents. Volunteers get a free ticket to the tour and get to attend the after party at New World Deli. Anyone interested in volunteering is asked to contact HPNA Vice President John Williams at:

<jawilli@grandecom.net>. Lisa Harris stated that the Fire Station Festival will take place on October 21st and needs more volunteers. Larry Gilg stated that the inaugural meeting of HPNA's Outreach Committee will be on October





Corner on Politics

I am sure it is no surprise but Election Day is Tuesday, November 6th. By this point, early voting and any other forms of voting are unavailable. Tuesday is your last chance to cast a vote, and not just for president but for many other important races and propositions on the ballot. I encourage everyone to look over those down-ballot elections and propositions, do whatever last-minute research that is necessary, and cast an informed vote. Often, it is the local elections and propositions that have a more direct influence on our lives.

Go out and vote early in the morning to be sure that you have cast your ballot and aren't rushed at the end of the day to squeeze it in before polling locations close. Polling locations are open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. as usual but lines always seem to become longer as the day progresses. Many employers are willing to give time off to vote. Arrange your workday schedules with your coworkers and be sure your employer is amenable.

I have just two reminders:

Photo ID is not required on Tuesday since the legislation passed last year is under judicial review but be sure to have proper identification to vote. The most common forms of ID will be your voter registration card or your Texas Driver License although other forms of ID are acceptable.

If you are someone who votes a straight party ticket then don't just click that one box and think that you are done. There are still quite a number of very important propositions on the ballot that require attention and are not party affiliated. Look over the ballot carefully to ensure that you have cast your vote correctly.

More than likely, the last things you will need to find from the websites below will be your polling location and what's on your ballot. Other information is also available. The websites are easy to navigate.



Dorothy Richter Receives Honorary Plaque

This year's 38th Annual Hyde Park
Fire Station Festival recognized the
extraordinary contributions of Hyde
Park's Mayor For Life with an Austin City
Council proclamation making October 21st,
2012 Dorothy Richter Day in Austin and
dedication of a commemorative plaque at the
Hyde Park Fire Station. City Council Member
Laura Morrison, a steadfast champion
of Hyde Park at City Hall, presented the
proclamation from Council.

Although last October's vote by HPNA members to make Dorothy a member of the association steering committee for life came too soon before the Festival to pay proper tribute to her, this year's event was the natural time and place. And we wanted to do all of this without involving Dorothy, to make it a surprise.

We first considered trying to get the city to name the HP Fire Station for Dorothy, but learned this was against city policy. I believe it was Bruce Elfant and Lisa Harris who came up with the idea of a plaque and councilmember Morrison's policy aide Barbara Rush worked with Asst. Fire Chief Matt Orta to gain the necessary approvals at City Hall.

We all knew Dorothy would be the first to oppose spending HPNA funds for such a tribute, so once we received approval for the plaque the challenge was to raise funds to pay for it. On Saturday morn-


ing, September 29th, I emailed about 60 of Dorothy's neighbors and friends across Austin seeking contributions. Fifteen minutes later, former HPNA President Lin Team was the first to respond and by Saturday evening we had raised enough to pay for the plaque. And then the pledges kept on coming. Lin suggested using additional contributions to create the Dorothy Richter Neighborhood Improvement Fund within the HPNA treasury. With the approval of the contributors, we accomplished that goal the day of the festival, with enough money collected to match the cost of the plaque.

Why Dorothy

Together with her late husband and former Texas State Senator Walter Richter, and since his passing, Dorothy Richter has been involved in virtually every effort to protect the fragile human scale historic environment of our neighborhood. From the founding of HPNA and recruitment of its first president; to saving the Fire Station itself; to putting herself between heavy equipment and threatened trees including the pecan tree at the Fire Station; to saving the Oliphant and Woodburn houses from demolition; to staging the first Historic Hyde Park Homes Tour; to creation of the Austin Tree Preservation Ordinance; to creation of the HP Local Historic District, Dorothy has been there for her neighbors. There were far too many accom-



A Sound Statement

To the Austin Music Commission, October 1, 2012

The Presidents of North University, Eastwoods, Hancock, and Hyde Park Neighborhood Associations have joined together to address the increasing intrusion of music from bars and clubs in the Downtown Entertainment District into our neighborhoods. This statement was approved by each of these four neighborhoods.

A Taskforce on Noise was active a few years ago, in which representatives from our neighborhoods participated. Some progress was made, but the increasing number of rooftop venues has created a new and even worse sound distribution phenomenon.

We believe that the City's commitment to increasing population density in the central part of town is threatened by the existence of the levels of sound currently allowed to permeate the area. There are certainly other neighborhoods where this is already a problem, and it will continue to be so until something is done to address the problem. We recommend that the following actions be taken:

- 1. Revise the sound ordinance to end the long distance trespass of all music, especially the bass and other low frequency sound waves that the current 85db limit fails to stop.
- 2. Apply the revised ordinance to outdoor and rooftop venues separately from indoor ones, with sound measurements taken at rooftop levels when that is the source of the sound.
- 3. Require indoor venues to limit passage of sound, upgrading walls, windows, doors and roof materials if necessary and pursue establishment of a rotating loan fund for this purpose.
- 4. Assign the Music Commission the responsibility to oversee enforcement of the revised ordinance and to pursue penalties for offending venues, including the loss of music licenses as the ultimate penalty after intermediate sanctions.
- 5. Notify potentially affected neighborhoods of all hearings for new and renewing music venue permits and require a public hearing before issuing any music venue permits.

We believe that these actions would protect the quality of life in Central Austin and enable the music industry to thrive in peace and harmony with the community.





Other issues that were discussed at the meeting


